Dear Parent/Guardian,

It gives me great pleasure to celebrate the success of our pupils and staff through this newsletter. The class of 2018 achieved excellent results with 70% of pupils gaining at least five A*-C GCSE grades including English and Mathematics. This newsletter shows how rich the experiences of our pupils are, both in School as well as in their lives outside School. Whether it is through extra-curricular activities, sporting achievements, debating, trips and visits, Duke of Edinburgh or through raising money for charity, our pupils continue to show resilience, creativity and a great work ethic epitomising all that is to be admired of a Pontarddulais Comprehensive pupil.

Taking over as Headteacher from Miss Waldron is a privilege, however, I can reassure you that I understand the importance of protecting the core values and ethos of the School to ensure we collectively 'build on excellence'. It is with great pleasure to inform you that Miss Waldron has recently been appointed as a Member of the British Empire (MBE) in the Queen's Birthday Honours. She visited Buckingham Palace during November to receive her award and has been recognised by Her Majesty for Services to Education. Her outstanding contribution to our School improvement journey was rightfully recognised during the Summer Term by being awarded the Wales Headteacher of the Year Award for 2018, she was also a finalist for UK Headteacher of the year. In her seconded role it will be of no surprise to hear that she is now shaping the education of future generations at a regional and national level.

As a Lead Curriculum Pioneer School a new Year 7 curriculum model for 'Science & Technology' and 'Health & Wellbeing' was launched this term. Initial feedback from pupils is extremely positive. Year 7 form tutors are explicitly teaching 'organisation' and 'kindness' as important aspects of a Pupil Character Roadmap designed to equip pupils with the character required be successful.

The community Remembrance Concert was particularly poignant due to it commemorating a centenary after the end of the First World War. The concert, held at our School, saw our pupils performing alongside a range of choirs, Pontarddulais Town Brass Band and local primary Schools. Pupils also excelled within the recent Christmas Concert. Music and drama pieces were of the highest quality and special thanks must go to Kay Carter, Kay Paton and Jane Pearce for preparing our pupils with such care and commitment. Such is the success of our Saxophone Band they have been asked to perform alongside our School Choir at the annual Goppa Concert and will be raising money to help fund the musical educational visit to France next year.

During November we celebrated the excellent results of the year 11 cohort of 2017-2018 with pupils and parents in our presentation evening. The awards presented are included in this newsletter. I would like to make a special mention to Abbie Jones who received the Community Award for her sustained contribution to supporting pupils in our STF. Also to Hannah Davies who achieved the remarkable feat of achieving 12 A* GCSE grades, winning the Academic Award.

Finally, I would like to thank you all for your continued support which makes everything in this newsletter possible.

May you all enjoy a peaceful and restful Christmas Holiday.

Six year 9 pupils were selected to work with Mr. Rees to put their ideas in an inspirational design that reflected the ethos of the School.


They worked together incorporating inspirational words from pupils and staff. The aim was to put pupils in the right frame of mind to achieve as they enter the School at the start of the School day.

We have made a busy start to the year with both our boys and girls rugby kicking off in September for the first time. Year 7 boys have made an excellent start to their rugby life in School with 37 pupils taking part in fixtures and festivals so far. They have made a strong start to their Swansea Cup campaign which will continue into the new year before the knock out stages begin in March which will also be followed by our Year 10 and 11 teams.

Year 8 and 9 boys have both been competing in a very difficult and competitive Ospreys cup competition. Although showing constant progression from their commitment to train and hard work, our year 8s have been unlucky with a few results just getting away from them and unfortunately didn't progress from the group stage. They have however continued to work hard and have given up their lunch times to prepare for the Swansea cup after Christmas.

Year 9 boys however became our first team to progress to the Semi Final of the Ospreys Cup. They were unfortunately beaten by last years winners Bryntawe, but it was an outstanding campaign none the less and one we are very proud of. They have come a long way and keep showing progress backed up by brushing aside strong Schools such as Cwmtawe, who we lost to at last years plate final, Morriston, Gowerton and Maes Y Dderwen. 




We took part in the community commemoration of 100 years since the end of World War 1. We made poppies to add to Community Poppy Cascade and to the exhibition.


On a frosty Tuesday we went to the National Botanical Gardens of Wales.

We then had a further treat of watching the amazing owl show.



Random Acts of Kindness Club!

After being inspired by some assemblies I had seen in School and hearing about similar clubs set up in other Schools, I decided to start a *Random Acts of Kindness Club*.

I wanted it to be led by pupils, and give them the opportunity to develop ways that they could instil some more kindness into the School community.

We meet once a fortnight in Humanities 3, and from very small beginnings, with 5 year 9 pupils at the first meeting, the group has grown and now on average has about 20 pupils regularly attending. The group has come up with lots of ideas and ways in which to spread some kindness, both as a group and individually. Some of the ideas they are already starting to put into place include:

- A kindness box in the foyer so anybody can post a message for someone (pupils/teachers/other staff) with a kind word ,some encouragement, a compliment or something they really appreciate about that person.
- Leaving positive notes and messages around the School.
- Joining the ECO litter troop who pick up rubbish around the School.
- Setting up a Breaktime Buddy Rota so if someone is alone at lunchtime they can go and sit with them and talk to them.

Pupils are also taking their ideas outside of the School community and helping others when they see someone who needs it, for example one of the group helped someone who was struggling to take their shopping back to their car. Although I have only just started to study medicine at Cardiff University, my decision to become a Dr has been positively affirmed many times already.

Because of the passion I have always had for music and art, many of my friends and family believed that I would eventually chose a career that would enable me to use my abilities in these areas. It wasn't until I started studying for my GCSEs that I really began to enjoy the sciences and think of the opportunities they could bring. With my love of animals, I seriously considered becoming a vet for a number of years. I even attended a vet's practice for my work experience in year 10. Whilst this was a very enjoyable and fascinating experience, it did show me that I would prefer to have a greater amount of human interaction. It was at that point I decided to do everything possible to enable me to become a Doctor. A further week spent shadowing a GP, cemented this decision and so I selected GCSE and then A level subjects that would enable me to follow my chosen career.

It is natural to have a certain degree of worry while waiting for A level results over the summer. As a result of these concerns, I began to explore potential alternative careers as a backup in case my route to medicine was hindered. Regardless of how much time I spent researching, no other university course or career made me feel as inspired and excited to learn as medicine did. This experience of looking for alternatives gave me further confirmation that medicine was the perfect choice for me.

Whilst University life as a Medical student is already proving very demanding, I have still managed to set aside some time to indulge my love of music. I auditioned to join the University's competing A Cappella group and was fortunate to get into their mixed voices group. I have also found a brass band to play in, however my love of art, is only really being used to help me draw anatomical parts at the moment! *Cerys Jones*
